## A Matter of Balance

The Mission Committee sponsored a class on balance and fall prevention since it is a prevalent issue among the members of our congregation.

The Program was provided free-of-charge in Fellowship Hall on the Mondays in May and June. It was presented by Berks Encore and funded by the Berks County Area Agency on Aging and Berks United Way.

At first it was challenging to have the number of participants we needed, but there were eventually thirteen of us which included people from two other churches joining in.

We learned many things from Martha Sitler, our facilitator, who is pictured below. She is a delightful, patient, and funny person who is also a church organist at Amity UCC. She even shared her personal fall story with us to help us feel comfortable enough to share our concerns.

Much of the work we did together involved reframing a fear of falling into a mindfulness experience of planning ahead to prevent falls and exercises to improve our ability to move with confidence to the best of our abilities. We explored many helpful hints and the importance of asking for help when we need it.

In one session a physical therapist came in and taught us proper ways of getting out of bed in the morning, the proper ways to use canes and walkers in a variety of circumstances, the best ways to get in and out of chairs, and why we should never try to help someone up who falls. (We could hurt them more, we could hurt ourselves, and there is the possibility of liability.)

Martha tells us that Berks Encore has other programs that we may find helpful in the future.


## My Favorite Hymn

When I asked Kathy Landis what her favorite hymn was, she quickly replied, "In the Bulb There is a Flower." She first heard this hymn many years ago when she was head of an Outreach Program. The hymn inspires her love of nature as she likes all things related to nature, including the flowers and butterflies mentioned in the song. Kathy likes the image in the song of a small seed growing into a large apple tree. She relates it to something small in a person like a message from the Holy Spirit bursting forth and becoming wonderful ideas. Perhaps it could be sharing the gospel with one person and then it spreads to others.

The hymn speaks of hope: "in our life, eternity; in our death, a resurrection. Kathy played the hymn on her violin for her good friend, Nora Bullock's funeral. Nora was also a nature lover and especially enjoyed tending to her flower garden. Kathy again chose this song to be sung at the memorial service for her husband, Carl Wolfinger. Kathy likes everything about this song: the tune, the words, and the meanings behind them.

## Stuffed Zucchini

1 lb . ground beef
1-2 onions diced
$1 / 2$ c. mayonnaise
1 tsp. lemon juice
$1 / 2$ green pepper, diced
5-6 oz. cheddar cheese, shredded

1 (15oz.) jar spaghetti sauce
1 zucchini
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. oregano
$1 / 4$ tsp. parsley

Directions:
Cut zucchini in $1 / 2$ lengthwise and scoop out seeds. Fry ground beef and onions together and drain. Mix mayonnaise, lemon juice, cheese, pepper, and seasonings in a small bowl. Mix in ground beef mixture. Spoon into zucchini. Top with spaghetti sauce. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes.

## Blueberry Peach Crisp

2 c . fresh blueberries
2 c. fresh peaches (sliced) add $3 / 4$ sugar to peaches
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
$1 / 4$ c. flour
$1 / 2$ tsp. cinnamon
Topping:
$1 / 3$ c. oats
$3 / 4$ c. flour
$1 / 2$ c. light brown sugar
1/3 c. Butter, melted
Directions:
Combine fruit, sugar, lemon juice, flour, and spices. Place in a buttered $8 \times 8$ pan. Mix topping ingredients and place over fruit. Bake for 35 minutes at 350 degrees.

During their annual Alumni Day celebration May 6, LTS honored Sara Hertzog by presenting her with the 2022 Allan S. Meck Award for Excellence in Pastoral Ministry, which honors the memory of Allan S. Meck, Class of 1911, president of the Seminary from 1947-57.

In addition, she has served as a consultant to shared ministry churches as Committee on Ministry chair of the Covenant Association, facilitator of a Community of Practice, and mentor to field education students, members in discernment, and licensed pastors.

Pastor Sara lives in Richmond Township with her husband Gary. They have two children, Beth Harbonic, a history teacher, and Nathan, co-owner of Weaknecht Archery. Pastor Sara enjoys knitting, golfing, traveling, and spending time with her four grandchildren.
