Sausage Stuffed-Mushrooms
Warm and satisfying, these cheesy two-bite hors d'oeuvres are delicious! Makes 24.

## Ingredients:

24 large white or cremini mushrooms
2 Tbsp olive oil
$1 / 2$ cup chopped onion
$1 / 4$ tsp salt and pepper
1 lb . Italian sausage, cooked and crumbled

1 (8oz) pkg cream cheese, cubed and softened
2 Tbsp parsley
$1 / 2$ tsp garlic powder

## Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees $F$. Coat a large baking sheet with cooking spray. Cut stems from mushrooms and chop into pieces leaving caps whole.
2. In a skillet, heat oil over medium-high. Add onion and chopped mushroom stems, salt and pepper. Cook 6 to 8 minutes, stirring often, until soft. Add cooked sausage, cream cheese, parsley and garlic powder. Stir together until cream cheese is completely melted.
3. Spoon about 1 Tbsp of the sausage mixture into mushroom caps and bake 25 to 30 minutes until mushrooms are soft and filling is heated through. Cool slightly before serving.

## CHICKEN LO MEIN

Ingredients:
4 boneless chicken breasts
$1 / 2$ red pepper
1 tbsp. oil
4 gloves garlic, minced
1 tbsp. fresh ginger
Sauce:
$1 / 2$ c chicken broth
4 tbsp. soy sauce
2 tbsp. hoisin sauce

4 scallions
8 - 10 oz. spaghetti noodles
$1 / 2$ cup Hoisin sauce


Fresh Vegetable: Broccoli, carrots, snap peas, etc.

2 tbsp. oyster sauce
2 tsp. sesame oil
4 tsp. corn starch

Instructions:
Pound chicken breasts to $1 / 2$ inch thick. Marinate in hoisin sauce for $\mathbf{3 0}$ minutes
Chop scallions and set green part aside
Combine all sauce ingredients and mix well.
Slice chicken diagonally and sauté
Cook noodles per package directions
Heat oil in a large pan. Add scallions, ginger, and garlic. Cook until fragrant and then add red pepper
Add fresh vegetables
Add sauce
Stir over medium heat until sauce is thickened.
Top with scallion greens

## GETTING TO KNOW...

This is the fourth new member interview that was done by June Rung and Kathy Landis. The interview was with Elaine Musser. Also present to add memorable items of interest were Diane Reidenauer, her daughter; Colin Heffley, younger brother; Judy Heffley, daughter-in-law.

## Q. WHERE ARE YOU FROM?

## Kutztown Folk Music Society Concerts



The March KFMS concert was a real treat with two of the Berks Fiddle Fest Champions sharing the sanctuary "stage." The first performer was 9 -year-old, Serafina, who brought an entourage of fans with her. She is the consummate professional, stating the name of the piece, the composer, and a bit of background about the music.

She played for 45 minutes without music! She was terrific, and her American style of playing was very fast-paced and accurate. She alternated between two fiddles. One of her first pieces was a reel called "The Lover's Waltz" in a traditional reel style called a "break down." She also played lively Scottish jigs, Slip jigs, and a Kentucky fiddle tune called "Half Irish" and many more selections from her repertoire. She sprinkled in Appalachian fiddle tunes, Blue Grass, and French-Canadian music, too. In case you missed her - or you are now among Serafina's fan club- the Worship Committee is planning to invite her to play for worship one Sunday.


Our second Fiddle Champion was Margaret Young, a 20-year-old multi-instrument artist who works as an apprentice at Meadowood Music repairing instruments among many other things. She wore a vintage costume, which is her custom when she has a gig. Her proud family was in attendance at the concert. Like Serafina, Margaret played for 45 minutes with no music and played such a variety of music! You may notice that her hand is smudged in the photo from the speed of her playing.

Margaret brought 4 fiddles with her but has a number of other instruments. Her style of playing is from the Celtic tradition. She began with a set of Pipe Reels and then switched to her Hardanger fiddle, considered to be the national instrument of Norway and a common fiddle in Greenland. It has 9 strings, rather than the 4 strings of other fiddles. The additional strings vibrate in sympathy beneath the other strings. It is a very ornate instrument, and it is "fussy" to keep it tuned due to its gut strings. It has an interesting tone quality and projects a bright sound.

It was so inspirational to hear these dedicated, talented young fiddlers and we encourage to attend a concert when you have any opportunity.


In April we were finally able to hear the renowned Sea Shanty singer (say that three times fast!), Don Sinetti, the official Sea Shanty singer for Mystic Seaport. He needed to be rescheduled several times, but he was able to venture down South to Kutztown from Connecticut to regale us with his talent.

Don's wife, Mary joins him on gigs and acts as his narrator. She also sweetly asks him to play her favorite tunes for the audience, including the one he sung to her at their wedding.

Don's music gives you the feeling of being a sailor at sea. The history of Sea Shanties is fascinating. For example, a ship must have had a Shanty Singer who needed to be clever enough to keep a tune going until a task such as hoisting the sails was complete, which took hours. Most Shanties were not written down, so the tunes were shared orally and passed from ship to ship.

We learned that sailors ate a lot of hardtack on board when food was scarce on five year long whaling trips. Hardtack is a non-perishable dense biscuit made of simple ingredients and baked several times until it was hard as a rock. They had to put hardtack in a liquid to make it edible and avoid breaking teeth. They also had rations of "spirits" to fortify them for their journeys because there wasn't much potable water available at sea.

My favorite song of the evening was the moving "The Skye Boat Song," which is the tune for theme for the Outlander series. The original folk tune is about the Scottish Bonnie Prince Charlie escaping to the Isle of Skye after the devastating loss at the Battle of Culloden in 1746. Here are some of the lyrics penned by Sir Harold Boulton:
"Speed, bonnie boat, like a bird on the wing, Onward! the sailors cry; Carry the lad that's born to be king Over the sea to Skye.
Loud the winds howl, loud the waves roar, Thunderclaps rend the air; Baffled, our foes stand by the shore, Follow they will not dare."

Aside from his musical pursuits, Don is also a talented artist. He draws whales in such detail that some of his work is on display in Hawaii where they also had an active whaling trade.

There is one installment left of this year's KFMS schedule, The Travis Wetzel Trio. Travis was a finalist in the ICMA 2017 musician of the year. Come on out and hear some wonderful live folk music.

## Passover Seder

On Saturday, April 9th the Confirmation Class hosted a Passover Seder in Fellowship Hall. It was led by Pastor Kim's friend, Leslie. They first hosted Seders together at Kutztown University when they were students and have previously hosted them at Longswamp UCC, Maidencreek Church, and St. John's UCC in Kutztown. Each guest brought a delicious, covered dish item to share.

It is believed that the Last Supper was a Passover Seder, so it is an appropriate event to lead into Palm Sunday and Holy Week. As an observant Jew, it would have been an annual tradition in Jesus' family. The Seder is a meal within a worship service remembering the Exodus of the children of Israel from Egypt. The Seder plate had symbolic items on it, such as, saltwater representing the tears of the oppressed Hebrew people. Horseradish represented the bitter herb and is symbolic of the bitterness of slavery. Another symbolic item is Charosets, a dish made of diced apples, walnuts, honey, cinnamon, and grape juice which represents the brick and mortar used by the Hebrews the re-build the Temple in Jerusalem.

There is always an empty table setting at the Seder table for Elijah. Dylan opened the entrance door to allow Elijah to enter the room if Elijah wished to enter. One of the highlights was the "hide and seek" of the Afikomen, a piece of matzo (a type of special unleavened cracker). Dylan and Natalie searched high and low, but ultimately Natalie found it and was rewarded with a prize. Michele Dugan sang a Passover Prayer in Hebrew, as did David Rung.

The Confirmation Class wishes to thank everyone who helped to plan the event, set up, Leslie for leading the Seder, each person who participated and brought food to share, and the clean-up crew.


## World Day of Prayer

Following the worship service, brunch was served. How exciting! - the first meal since the pandemic restrictions in the church. Delicious homemade potato/leek soup, cream cheese/cucumber tea sandwiches, and blueberry scones-mmm- served with different blends of tea and coffee.

A British theme lent a flair to the event with fantastic decorations including a side table of books, articles and photos highlighting the British Isles. On the tables were red British "telly" booths with flowers.

So many members contributed to the planning of the day and many more participated in the worship service itself and created/served the festive menu. I choose not to list all the participant names because I am sure I would miss some important contributors to the success of the program. Thanks to all the volunteers who were responsible and to the eighteen attendees who had a great, enlightening, and fun experience. Let's do it again!

This service is a "shush-free" service filled with music, a Bible story or brief sermon (3-4 minutes), and an opportunity to socialize. The "rejoicers" actively participate in the worship service, reading scripture, leading prayers, and singing songs of praise.

Charlene and Steve Fisher, along with several other members of Trinity Lutheran Church, began looking into Rejoicing Spirits. They quickly realized that this was bigger than just one church and began to reach out to other congregations in the Brandywine, Fleetwood, Kutztown areas. Several churches indicated an interest, ours being one of them. Fueled by this community interest, they began the search for an accessible site. Enter St. Paul's UCC! After touring several churches in the area, it was decided that St. Paul's would be the site for the monthly worship.

We had to complete a Congregational Audit (answering questions about the accessibility of our church) and a Feasibility Study to determine the need for such a program. After completing these 2 tasks and meeting with the Steering Committee on March 29th, we are ready for our second coaching call with Reverend Dave DeFreese to determine our next steps.

As this worship service becomes a reality, we will be looking for volunteersgreeters, musicians, set-up, clean-up and food/snack prep. If you are interested in volunteering, please let me know!
