*Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. –
Hebrews 13:8*

When I feel like everything is changing – and at a breakneck pace, this scripture is a comfort. God is still God Almighty. Jesus came, lived, taught, died, rose again and sits at the right hand of God. The Holy Spirit still surrounds us and is in us. Phew! When the world feels like its spinning, we can close our eyes and pray to God, Three-in-one.

While the Triune God does not change, and Jesus is the same, the church *does* change. We are not the same body that began when Jesus said, “Peter, on this rock, I will build my church” (Matthew 16:18) We are not the same church the Reformers built when they felt the need to turn away from what they saw as corruption in the institutional church of their day. We are not the same church that began in the “new world,” when immigrants came from Europe to this land, and we are not the same church that formed in 1957 when the Evangelical and Reform church merged with the Congregational Christian church to form the United Church of Christ. We are not the same church, and the culture in which we live is not the same.

While we may not like some of the changes we’ve experienced in the church and culture, we can and do celebrate others. We celebrate the radical inclusivity in the United Church of Christ that causes us to accept all children of God in our worship and community life. We celebrate the movement of the Holy Spirit among us that inspires us to use our God-given creativity and to discern how we might worship God, teach the ways of Jesus and inspire to faith a whole new generation.

We are called to honor the historic affirmations of our faith and to find new ways to show our love of God in words, songs, and actions. At the same time, I want to reaffirm what you might be thinking -- and that the New Testament book of Hebrews stated eloquently, “Do not be carried away by all kinds of strange teachings, for it is good for the heart to be strengthened by grace.”(Hebrews 13:9) There are many voices “out there” in the marketplace. There are those who might say they are people of faith, while lining their own pockets with ill-gotten gains.

Yes, things will change during our time of Interim Ministry. Nothing will change just for the sake of change. I promise that I will not promote an agenda that is counter to what I believe Jesus taught (and what has been verified by other religious scholars). There will be times when you agree with what I say or do. There will also be times when you disagree with what I say or do. That is natural (and good) when we humans dare to be open (and loving) in our communications.

I encourage you to come talk to me about changes that you see, or changes that you'd like to see. I highly encourage you to speak to me directly. I value your input and I especially like to hear about the practices that help you maintain and grow your relationship to God. While I do have office hours when you can just drop in (Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays 9am-noon), you're welcome to make an appointment for another time when we can talk with less interruptions.

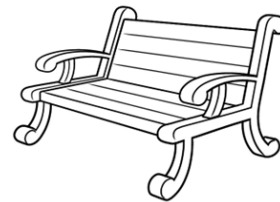

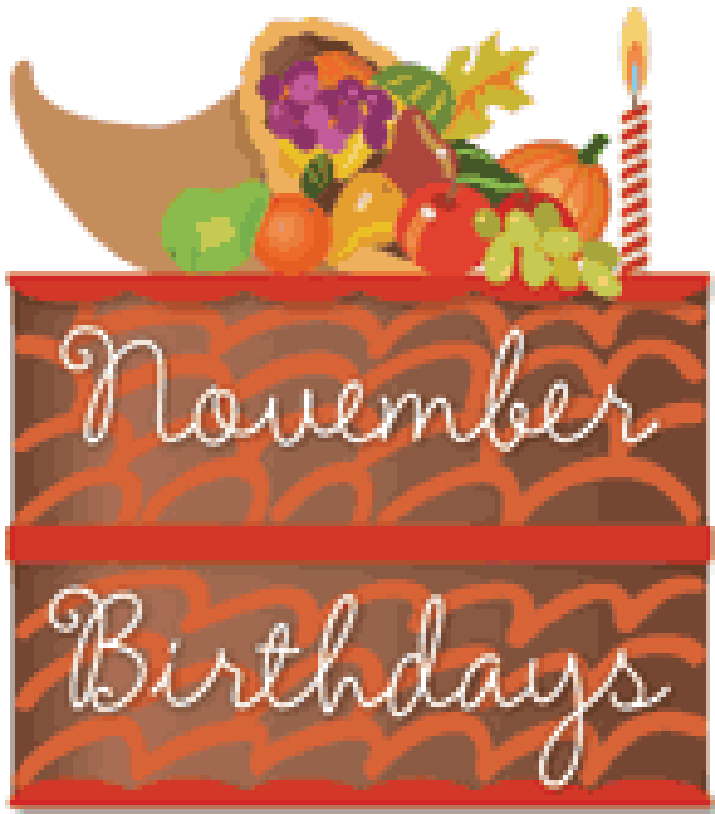

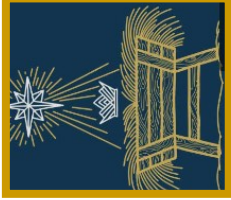

When I asked Mandy Boyer what her favorite hymn was, her first answer was “Blessed Assurance”, a well-known Christian hymn found on page 572 in our hymnal. She likes the melody and the words really speak to her. The words were written by a blind mission worker, Fanny Crosby, in 1873. She was visiting her wealthy friend, Phoebe Knapp, who played a new tune she had composed. “What do you think the tune says?” Crosby replied, “Blessed Assurance, Jesus is Mine.” It reflects Crosby’s walk of faith, as expressed by the apostle Paul in Philippians, “For to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain.” Mandy also likes “It Is Well with My Soul” found on page 705 in our hymnal. When Mandy’s mother, Mary Geist, passed away, this song kept running through her head and gave her comfort. This hymn was written by Horatio Spafford with music by Philip Bliss. Spafford wrote it after undergoing severe hardships and tragedy. He lost his real estate investments during the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, and his finances took a hit during the Panic of 1873. Then his four daughters drowned when their steamship Ville du Havre sank. His wife barely survived the tragedy. In spite of all of this, he leaned on his faith in God and wrote this famous hymn.

Young at Heart

On Wednesday, September 18, twenty-seven people gathered to hear about an unsung hero of the American Revolution—that's how Benjamin Franklin is remembered by Joseph and Delores McDevitt. Dressed as Franklin, Joseph brought Ben to life as he told of Ben's young years, accomplishments, scientific inventions, and his effect on the early times of the American nation and international relations.

From Franklin's autobiography, the McDevitts shared Ben's "Project of Arriving at Moral Perfection." Ben used terms for virtues that could apply to any sect or religion, not just Christianity. He was methodical about judging himself daily to see how he measured up to these moral values. Each morning he would ask himself, "What good can I do today?" and at the end of the day, he asked, "What good did I do today?" He looked forward, thinking about how to make things better in the world. So much is known about Franklin through his autobiography, diaries, and other writings. Joseph and Delores encouraged everyone to write a book, or keep a diary to save especially for grandchildren to read so they will know their grandparents better.

Here are the moral virtues that Franklin tried his best to live by:

Temperance—Eat not to dullness; drink not to elevation.

Silence—Speak not but what may benefit others or yourself; avoid trifling conversation

Order—Let all your things have their places; let each part of your business have its time

Resolution—Resolve to perform what you ought; perform without fail what you resolve

Frugality—Make no expense but to do good to others or yourself; i.e. waste nothing

Industry—Lose no time; be always employed in something useful; cut off all unnecessary actions

Sincerity—Use no hurtful deceit; think innocently and justly; and if you speak, speak accordingly

Justice—Wrong none by doing injuries, or omitting the benefits that are your duty

Moderation—Avoid extremes; forbear resenting injuries so much as you think they deserve

Cleanliness—Tolerate no uncleanness in body, clothes, or habitation

Tranquility—Be not disturbed at trifles, or at accidents common or unavoidable

Chastity

Humility—Imitate Jesus and Socrates

The program ended with Delores sharing her personal spiritual beliefs from the Bible.

NEWS FROM CONSISTORY

THE PULSE: At the October 9th Consistory meeting, Marge announced that she would be stepping down from managing the Pulse. However, she will complete the November/December issue which will be mailed out as usual. Going forward, the Pulse will be emailed and some printed copies will be available at church. This is a cost-saving initiative due to increase in postage and cost of paper and copying. To those members who cannot make it to church or cannot receive email, the office will mail a copy if requested. In addition, a task force will review the format of the Pulse and consider possible changes to make it a simpler process. Anyone with suggestions who would be interested in assisting in the effort, please contact Barb in the office.

DISASTER RELIEF: The Consistory approved spending up to \$10,000 for disaster relief from Hurricanes Helene and Milton comingled with contributions from church committees and individual members of the church. The donations will go directly to Disaster Relief at the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference which will then send to locations needing it. No money is taken out for administrative costs, so all money donated will be used for the sole purpose of disaster relief. When you would like to make a contribution, please make out the check to St. Paul's UCC and on the memo line, write "Disaster Relief." You may put in the offering or give to Barb in the office. The church office will collect donations and forward to PSEC.

PA SOUTHEAST FALL CONFERENCE: Meeting is on Saturday, November 9 from 10 AM to 1 PM at Good Shepherd UCC in Tuckerton(Reading). Currently, Pastor Deb, Daryn Keim, Denise Keim, Ray and Ann Oswald, Barb Krause, and Kathy Landis are planning to attend. If anyone else would like to go, please contact Barb in the office by October 30. Everyone attending must register on the psec.org website.

FRACTURED LIVES FRACTURED CHURCHES: The workshop was attended by Pastor Deb, Erin Webb, Brian and Ethel Beck, and Kathy Landis. It was led by Jay Lightmeyer of the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center. The basis for the day was that "a splintered vine bears no fruit" and the church can promote healing. We live in a fractured world, country, community and even families, and this can result in a fractured (divided) church. Most of the program featured an understanding of relationships and how to get to know people better, not always to avoid conflict but to be humble, gentle, patient, and bear with one another in love. The members who attended will share some of their learnings with the Consistory and congregation.

2025 BUDGET: The church budget for 2025 will be reviewed and approved by the Consistory in time for the Congregational Meeting on November 17th. At this meeting, the budget will be presented and the congregation will have the opportunity to also approve the budget.

COVENANT: Pastor Deb asked all Consistory members to consider what they promise to do for the Consistory and the church in the coming year. The Pastor will summarize the suggested ideas and bring them back for the Consistory to review and agree to the covenant. She is also asking that each committee develop a covenant which will help to define the priorities of the group.
