

Why Do We Need Forgiveness?

Forgiveness is at the very heart of our faith. Without it, our relationship with God and others becomes fractured, weighed down by guilt, resentment, and regret. But why is forgiveness so essential, and what does it accomplish in our lives?

Sin separates us from God, creating a divide we cannot cross on our own. God's gift of forgiveness, made possible through Jesus' sacrifice, bridges that chasm. It allows us to draw close to Him, no longer defined by our mistakes but by His grace. Through forgiveness, we are cleansed, set free from the weight of our wrongdoing, and welcomed into fellowship with a loving Father who never withholds His mercy from those who seek it.

Forgiveness also transforms how we interact with others. Relationships inevitably bring hurt—intentional or not—and holding on to anger or bitterness only deepens the pain. Forgiving does not mean ignoring the wrong done to us, but it does mean choosing to release the debt. It is a decision to trust God with our wounds, no longer letting resentment define our hearts or actions. This is only possible because we have experienced His forgiveness firsthand. When we forgive, we reflect God's nature and make space for healing, reconciliation, and peace.

However, forgiveness requires humility. It means admitting our own need for grace and extending that grace to others, even when it feels undeserved. It is less about fairness and more about faith—faith that God will bring restoration in ways we cannot and faith that the freedom found in forgiveness is worth the cost.




Eastern Berks County

Greetings from Consistory

Last month we were anticipating <u>a fresh start</u> with a new pastor. As expected, Pastor James Latimer (Pastor Jim) began as our Interim Pastor on Tuesday, September 2 and preached on Sunday, September 7. During his first week, he spent time getting to know Barb and the office practices and met with Kathy to learn about the Consistory and what the church's business priorities are at the moment. During the second week, he organized his "Meet and Greet with Pastor Jim" to meet

members, "hear their stories," and build relationships within our congregation. To set up a time for you to participate, please sign up on the window outside the church office or call the office.

As a reminder, Pastor Jim has been hired as a three-quarter time minister, which calls for an average of 30-35 hours per week. Currently, he is planning to be in the office from 10 AM to 1 PM, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Also, he would like to meet with the Transition/Search Team in the next week or two.

On Sunday, September 14, St. Paul's served a delicious luncheon and cake after the church service to welcome Pastor Jim. We offered a short speech about how we are glad to have hm with us and then played part of the song "Welcome to My World" recorded by Elvis Presley. The fellowship was well attended and everyone had time to chat. When Pastor cut the cake, he invited us to gather around him for a memorable photo. Keep Pastor Jim in your prayers and continue to encourage him and offer your assistance.

Another topic at the Consistory has been the cleaning of the church since we have no sexton. The deacons and other volunteers, including members of the Property Committee, have been keeping the church clean. Plus, Brian Unger from his participation in his company's Behr Cares program scrubbed floors, sprayed weeds, lubricated the stairlift, etc. In the week ahead, a janitorial company will be coming to the church to do an initial cleaning. Based on their performance, the church may continue to use them for our housekeeping chores. However, they may only be here for 4 hours/week so some volunteers will be needed occasionally to take on other chores. This is an effort to reduce the impact on our church budget. Recently the church has been transferring funds from Merrill Lynch accounts, more than usual, to keep up with bills and payroll.

Speaking of the 2026 budget, it has been approved by the Consistory and will be brought before the congregation for approval at the Congregational Meeting on November 16. Also, the revised bylaws that were approved by the Consistory will be presented for congregational members to approve. All members will receive the proposed budget and bylaws through email so that everyone will have time to review 30 days prior to the meeting.

Another item before the Consistory is the request from Cornerstone Community Church to use our Fellowship Hall for their worship services and two other rooms currently unused for their children's Sunday School. Several members of St Paul's have met with Pastor Nate and four other members of his church to discuss the possibilities. Cornerstone approached St. Paul's back in July with their request. The Consistory spent time discussing the issue with many questions. In the next couple of weeks, we will hold a special Consistory meeting in which members of the congregation are welcome to attend and express their various points of view. At that time, the Consistory may take a vote whether to allow Cornerstone to use our facilities. They will be paying rent each month for their use. If you have any questions and would like to learn more, please speak to Kathy Landis, Steve Leinbach, Louise Moyer, or Dave Abel since they met with the Cornerstone group.
